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women's enormous contributions to rural families, households, and communities. I also hope that I have successfully managed to grasp and give voice to women's (and men's) everyday lives and experiences in an appropriate and dignified way. Since the anthropologist is immediately drawn into and caught up into the world of our research participants, accounts of their lives and cultures inevitably shape our attitudes towards them and towards ourselves. I assume full responsibility in my constructions and representations of my research participants and hope that I have not offended or misrepresented anyone in this study. Moreover, I hope that my presence and interactions in the field have had positives outcomes and has emboldened some women to challenge and undermine the existing gender relations that are detrimental to their wellbeing.

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
