#### **Biographies**

**Shlomo Balsam** was born in Paris. After immigrating to Israel in 1968, he returned to France in 1972 to earn his Master's degree in business studies at the Sorbonne. He taught at the Yavneh Jewish High School in Paris and worked for the "Bnei Akiva" youth movement. In the 1970s and 1980s he traveled to the Soviet Union to meet with Jewish dissidents who were not allowed to travel to Israel. Most recently, he was employed in the Department of Jewish Zionist Education at the Jewish Agency. Today, Schlomo Balsam works as a freelancer at the ISHS in Yad Vashem.

Liz Elsby was born in New York in 1963, studied in the High School for the Performing and Visual Arts in Houston, and was awarded the honor of Presidential Scholar in the Arts in 1982. She made aliyah in 1984, served 2 years in the IDF as a graphic designer in the Education Corps, and later received her degree in graphic design and illustration from the Bezalel Academy in 1991. After working as a freelance illustrator for more than ten years, she was able to combine her love of art and design with her passion for Holocaust education when she began working in 2006 at Yad Vashem. At Yad Vashem she serves as the graphic designer for the Yad Vashem International School website, for which she also writes lesson plans and articles. She also draws and illustrates Holocaust-related themes. Liz serves as a guide for student groups, organizations, and individuals in the Yad Vashem museum and campus, and gives lectures about Holocaust art and other topics.

Lori Gerson has a BA in political science from Barnard College, Columbia University. She began her career in Jewish education at Block Yeshiva High School in St. Louis, Missouri, where she taught Jewish studies and served as the school's program director. After relocating to Chicago, Lori then became the first director of the Center for Excellence in Teaching. In that capacity, she set up and ran Chicago's only training center for Jewish day school educators. After making aliya Lori joined the Yad Vashem team as a guide for educational groups. Since 2016, Lori has taken on the role of Educational Coordinator in Yad

Vashem's International Training and Education Department where she lectures, helps coordinate seminars, develops curriculum and guides educators in best practices.

Sarah Levy was born in London and moved to Israel in early 2000 with her family. She has a diploma in teaching from the London Board of Jewish Religious Education, holds a degree in Business Law (LLB Hons.) from the London Guildhall University and is a qualified TEFL teacher (University of Cambridge). Sarah has over 30 years of experience in both formal and informal education teaching Jewish Studies, English and business English. Since 2018, Sarah has been the Program Coordinator for the Echoes & Reflections Holocaust educational program at Yad Vashem. She is also a licensed guide at Yad Vashem's Holocaust History Museum where she regularly guides groups of teachers and students from English-speaking countries.

**Yiftach Meiri** was born in 1968, and grew up in Jerusalem. He received his B.A in History at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem. Yiftach began working in Yad Vashem in 1999 as a guide, mostly with Israeli pupils.

He currently heads the UK, Ireland, Scandinavia and Finland desks at the International Education and Training Department, International School for Holocaust Studies, Yad Vashem.

Lea Garyfallia Micha (Seminar coordinator) is the Head of the Educational programs, Balkan Countries, Greece and Cyprus at the International School for Holocaust Studies et Yad Vashem. Lea is a political scientist and researcher and works at Yad Vashem since 2013, initially as a researcher at the International Institute for Holocaust Research at Yad Vashem (the Deportation Database and Research project), and later in the Righteous among the Nations department. Lea holds a BA in Political Science and a Research Master's degree (Master 2 Recherche) in International Relations from the University of Sorbonne (Paris I), Paris, France, as well as a BA in Religions from the University of Athens, Greece. She started her PhD on Greek-Israeli relations in the department of Political Science / International relations at the University of Sorbonne and, she also worked as research fellow at Bar-Ilan University, Israel, as a scholar of the Israeli Ministry of Foreign Affairs.

**Esther Rachow** was born in Germany and moved to Israel in 2012. She received her B.A. in Cultural and Media Education from the University of Applied Science in Merseburg and her M.A. in Public History from the Freie Universität Berlin. She has worked extensively on topics such as contemporary history, Holocaust historiography and memory in both Israel and Germany, and served as an educator for youth and professionals in national and international frameworks. In her present capacity, Esther works for the Section of German Speaking Countries and Hungary of the International Education and Training Department at the International School for Holocaust Studies, Yad Vashem.

**Daniel Rozenga** was born in the Netherlands. He studied there in the Teacher's Academy and later he began studying ancient Greek and Latin at the University of Groningen. He then moved to Amsterdam to study Semitic languages at the Amsterdam University and also worked as a school teacher. He currently works at the German Desk of the European Department of the International School for Holocaust Studies in Yad Vashem, is the head of the Dutch Desk and is also working in a High School as an English teacher.

**Dr. Robert Rozett** is a Senior Historian in the International Institute for Holocaust Research, Yad Vashem. Between 1993-2018 he served as Director of the Libraries at Yad Vashem and has worked at Yad Vashem in various capacities since 1981. He is the author of *Conscripted Slaves, Hungarian Jewish Forced Laborers on the Eastern Front*, Yad Vashem 2013, a finalist for a National Jewish Book Award, 2014, and *Approaching the Holocaust, Texts and Contexts*, Valentine Mitchell, 2005. He is the co-editor with Iael Nidam Orvieto of the album of letters written by Holocaust survivors, *After So Much Pain and Anguish: First Letters after Liberation*, Yad Vashem 2016. He is the co-editor of *The Encyclopedia of the Holocaust*, New York: Facts on File in Association with Yad Vashem, 2000, was the associate editor of the *Encyclopedia of the Holocaust*, New York: Macmillan, 1990, and he is the co-editor with Avraham Milgrom

of *Heroism at the Inferno's Core, An Anthology*, Yad Vashem and the Knesset, 2013 (Hebrew) and also with Milgrom, *The Holocaust: Frequently Asked Questions*, Yad Vashem and the Knesset, 2005. Dr. Rozett has lectured around the world and in recent years has been the keynote speaker for Holocaust Remembrance Day events in Belgium, Ethiopia, South Africa, Ghana and Canada. He has guided many dignitaries through Yad Vashem and has represented Yad Vashem in various international forums concerning the Holocaust and contemporary anti-Semitism. He serves as the historical advisor for the Echoes and Reflections educational program.

Rafael Vago (Ph.D.) was born in Romania in 1946. He received his PhD in Modern Eastern European History from Tel Aviv University focusing on Hungarian-Romanian Relations after 1945. Dr. Vago is presently a Senior Researcher at the Kantor Center for the Study of Contemporary European Jewry, Tel Aviv University's Department of History and The Cummings Center for Russian and East European Studies. He is the research coordinator for the Institute on the study of antisemitism. His publications include: "Anti-Semitism and the Treatment of the Holocaust in Slovakia" in Randolph Braham, Ed; Anti-Semitism and the Treatment of the Holocaust in Post-Communist Eastern Europe, New York, 1994; "Romanian Jewry in the Interwar Period" in Randolph Braham, Ed. The Holocaust in Romania and "The Quest for the 'Authentic' Central Europe", in Being Jewish in 21st Century Central Europe, 2020. Dr. Vago was a member of the International Commission of Historians on the Holocaust in Romania and the academic editor of the five-volume English edition of The History of the Jews in Romania published by Tel Aviv University.

Danijel Vojak is a research associate at the Institute of Social Science "Ivo Pilar" in Zagreb. In 2011 I have finished my Phd with the topic Of the eve of the War: Position of the Roma population in Banate of Croatia in the period 1939 - 1941 on Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences (University of Zagreb). I have published books and papers on history of Roma in First World War and Second World War and I have been working on several international and domestic project regarding project history Roma: "Voices of the Victims" (part of Rom Archive project; Karola Fings, 2017), Roma Early Childhood Inclusion (RECI+) (Open Society Foundation, Pučko otvoreno učilište "Korak po korak", UNICEF-a i REF; 2014 - 2015), especially as a project leader: Stradanje Roma na području Nezavisne Države Hrvatske za vrijeme Drugoga svjetskog rata [Suffering of Roma in the Independent State of Croatia during the Second World War] (Institute of Social Science 'Ivo Pilar', Romsko nacionalno vijeće, 2015), Spomenici i kultura sjećanja: Komemoriranje žrtava Židova, Srba i Roma od 1945. do 2016 [Memories and Cultures of Remembrance: Commemoration of Victims of Jews, Serbs and Roma from 1945 to 2016] (Institute of Social Science 'Ivo Pilar', Romsko nacionalno vijeće, 2017), Stradanje Roma u Hrvatskoj u Drugom svjetskom ratu: Dokumenti, sjećanja, obrazovanje [Roma Suffering in Croatia during the Second World War: Documents, Memories, Educationg (Stiftung "Erinnerung, Verantwortung und Zukunft", Berlin, 2017 - 2018). In his work he is focusing on analyzing the relationship between indigenous (majority) population and the Roma minority population in this area. His current research focus is on analyzing the position and extent of the suffering of Roma during the Second World War in the pro-Nazi Independent State of Croatia.
